### Framing Your Specific Ask

- Try to frame your position around positive actions (DO do this, invest MORE in that) rather than negative ones (STOP doing that, make CUTS to this).
- Try to tie what you're asking for to things that are already on legislators' minds: finding enough funding for our transportation system and fixing/sustaining ODOT.
- Share why your ask is important to you personally: what would your ask look like or change in your personal context?



### Trails in a Transportation Measure

- Trails are the backbone of active transportation networks
- Trails create <u>safe</u> places for people of all ages and abilities to walk and bike
- Trails support local tourism economies
- Trails increase access to nature and health and wellness.

### What we need:

- Policy language to support inclusion of walking and biking infrastructure in major capital project corridors to leverage more federal funding
- Fill the \$60 million biennial funding gap for Oregon Community Paths



# Our History, Our Roots





### 1982

El Programa Hispano began as part of Catholic Family Services, one of the agencies that later merged to become Catholic Charities. We started with a single outreach worker to help support and empower Latine farm-workers.



### 1986

Our work expanded as the years went by and we witnessed Catholic Charities provide support to the 200,000+ immigrants who qualified for amnesty under the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986.



# Our History, Our Roots





### 1990

We worked to meet migrant growing farm workers' basic needs such as food, housing, healthcare, translation assistance, driver's education, camp medical clinics, legal assistance, and advocacy.



### 1995

We hired our first domestic violence advocate. This marked the beginning of UNICA, Oregon's first fully bi-lingual and bi-cultural response and prevention program for survivors of domestic and sexual violence. Today UNICA has over 20 staff members, family education programs, and Oregon's only 24-hour bilingual and bicultural emergency hot-line.



# Our History, Our Roots







### 2015

In 2015, El Programa Hispano became an independent 501(c)3 organization. Over the next 5 years, we worked to stand up and stabilize a new organization by establishing administrative services (finance, operations, quality assurance, human resources, etc.).

Today, **El Programa serves over 32,000 individuals annually** through our Economic Sustainability, Education, Community Wellness, and Domestic Violence and Sexual Violence Survivor Support Programs in three Oregon counties: **Multnomah, Clackamas, and Washington.** 

### **Our Services**



We provide culturally-specific events, trainings, and activities to students and their families a 7 elementary/middle schools in East Multnomah County.

- After school services
- Early childhood education
- Youth & family engagement
- Cultural awareness & student empowerment



Specialized and bilingual case managers work with families who have limited to no income, to engage in flexible services and activities designed to improve their well being, housing conditions, and increase their earning potential.

- Housing navigation, placement, retention
- Rental assistance and legal support
- Family stability services

### Our Services



We provide culturally responsive services for families and seniors over the age of 60 including weekly meals and physical activities, nutrition education, and restoration of culturally specific connections to land and food.





Red Electric Trail Planning Study May 2007





### WHAT WE'VE HEARD THROUGHOUT THIS PROCESS

- Support for the proposed trail and amenities
- Support for preserving the natural environment, tree canopy, and habitat, including wetland character where possible.
- Support for interactive signage of: history of the area and the former Red Electric Rail, indigenous peoples, labels for trees and plants, and notice of a closed campus near Hayhurst Elementary
- Desire for a safe route to school
- Support for elements of play and nature in the trail's design

- Support for near-term construction of the trail
- Concerns about trail crossings at SW Shattuck Rd and SW Cameron Rd
- Concerns for attracting undesirable use of the trail, litter and privacy
- Concerns about flooding issues along SW Fairvale Court
- Concerns about too much lighting along the trial itself
- Support to retain the handball court at Pendleton Park



#### SEGMENT 1 SW Shattuck Road to SW 55th Drive

**Existing Condition:** Heavily vegetated area with areas of standing water

**Design Considerations:** Trail alignment to limit tree removal in environmental sensitive areas and avoid standing water



**Design Considerations:** Choose alignment that does not conflict with activities at Pendelton Park. Add planting to create screen between trail and private property

#### **SEGMENT 3** Hayhurst Elementary School

**Existing Condition:** Heavily vegetated area with areas of standing water

Design Considerations: Alignment alternatives include constructing the trail at the bottom of the bank requiring additional drainage measures or above the bank requiring additional grading and retaining walls

#### **SEGMENT 4** Along SW Fairvale Ct


**Existing Condition:** Existing asphalt road in poor condition with driveway access and no drainage

**Design Considerations:** Shared roadway for vehicles, bikes and pedestrians or separated mixed-use path

#### **SEGMENT 5** Along SW Cameron Rd


**Existing Condition:** Frontage zone with driveways, trees and utilities. There is a drainage ditch along the South side







#### **Technical Feasibility Issues: Traffic**

#### **SW Cameron Rd**

- Posted Speed Limit: 30 MPH
- 85<sup>th</sup> percentile: 37 MPH
- 3-4% downgrade, wide turning radii


#### **SW Shattuck Rd**

- Posted Speed Limit: 25 MPH
- 85<sup>th</sup> percentile: 34 MPH


- Signing and striping, a striped marked crosswalk, accessible tactile devices, and curb ramps to meet ADA standards, Rectangular Rapid Flash Beacons

#### **Technical Feasibility Issues: Trees**




- 346 trees within project site
  - 220 classified as native
  - 98 classified as nuisance
  - 121 were identified as dead, critical, or in poor condition
- 34 native trees need to be removed



#### **Technical Feasibility Issues: Environment**

- 3 Ponded Areas (likely artificially created)
- 1 Ditch (artificial)
- 6 Wetlands
  - 2 likely artificially created
  - 4 likely naturally-occurring









**Existing System:** Roadside ditches and drainage pipes, ultimately outfalling to Pendleton Creek, poor infiltration



- Purchased in 2001, developed in 2012
- Safety Audit evaluates the Trolley Trail from Milwaukie to Gladstone










# Corridor-wide observations

#### **Key findings**

- The bollard and basalt trailhead markers are effective at forcing trail users to recognize and slow down at intersections
- Noise pollution generated from McLoughlin Blvd.
- Some scooters/e-bikes moved through the corridor at high speeds
- Trail users generally self-regulate speed, share the path, and slow down to pass














Great Rivers Greenway



# Highlights:

- Brickline Greenway
- Arch Grounds/ Riverfront Highway Cap
- Katy Trail















Brickline Greenway is a major public-private partnership with an anticipated total cost of \$245 million.

\$18 million will come from Great Rivers Greenway, which is funded through local sales tax dollars from a vote of the people. \$75 million will come from other public funding sources, such as federal or state funds. <u>\$152 million will be raised from private, philanthropic donors.</u>

As of Spring 2024, still in the early stages of planning and design and before a fundraising campaign has even launched, the ambitious goal is <u>nearly 46%</u> <u>funded:</u>

- 100% of the local public investment is in place;
- 71% of the federal/state investment is secured;
- 28% of the philanthropic funding is already pledged or donated.


