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PROGRAM OVERVIEW

The Solid Waste Community Enhancement Program provides grants to improve economic opportunities, neighborhood livability, public safety, and more in areas near the region's garbage transfer and reload facilities. The purpose of the program is to enhance the area around eligible solid waste facilities in the Metro region. The program was established by Metro Council in 1986. Since then, Metro has collected and re-invested millions of dollars in communities across the greater Portland area. Community Enhancement and Investment Fees

Metro's solid waste authority, including the authority to collect an enhancement fee to establish and implement a solid waste community enhancement program, is established under the Oregon Constitution, Oregon Revised Statutes Chapters 268 and 459, and the Metro Charter. The program is guided by Metro Code Chapter 5.06, Solid Waste Community Enhancement Program.

Solid waste facilities in the Metro region that operate as disposal sites, transfer stations, reload facilities, food waste compost facilities, and energy recovery facilities collect an enhancement fee of \$1.00 on each ton of putrescible solid waste delivered to the facility. Yard debris reload or composting facilities are not subject to this requirement unless the facility also accepts food waste with yard debris.

Solid waste facilities in the Metro region also have the option to collect an additional Community Investment Fee of either an \$0.50 per ton on putrescible waste in addition to existing community enhancement fees, or \$1.00 per ton on all types of waste received that are not currently subject to any enhancement fee. The fees are then granted to local communities as part of the Community Enhancement Program.

Administration

The program is administered by Metro directly, through an intergovernmental agreement (IGA) with the city or county government where the facility is located or through a contract with a non-profit organization. Participating facilities remit enhancement fees to Metro on a monthly basis, which in turn, remits payment to local governments on a quarterly basis.

A Community Enhancement Program Advisory Committee is responsible for implementation of each of the local programs. Each committee establishes the enhancement area boundary, creates committee bylaws, reviews program budgets, develops a process for soliciting and selecting projects, and makes grant funding decisions. The Metro Councilor for the district where the facility is located has the option to serve on the community enhancement committee as co-chair, voting member, or non-voting member of the

committee. Each committee submits a report of accounts and expenses to Metro for the previous fiscal year by October 1 of each calendar year for tracking purposes.

Active Programs

In FY 23-24 funds from eight facilities were awarded back into local communities: Forest Grove, Oregon City, Wilsonville, Sherwood, Gresham, Troutdale, Fairview, Wood Village, North Portland and NE Portland.

Each of the enhancement grant programs award funds in a different geographical target area surrounding the facility where funds are generated. Individual grant review committees of local residents and elected officials solicit and select on their own grant timelines. Program Goals

To be considered for Community Enhancement Program funding, projects must be located in the solid waste community enhancement area boundary, as specified by the solid waste community enhancement committee, or the project must benefit individuals or programs located inside the solid waste community enhancement area boundary. Projects must meet at least one of the Program Goals listed below:

- Provide programs, training or services that benefit underserved populations.
- Increase reuse and recycling opportunities; reduce the toxicity of waste.
- Improve the environmental quality of the area.
- Preserve or improve natural areas; increase public access.
- Improve or increase recreational areas and programs.
- Rehabilitate and upgrade property owned or operated by non-profits.
- Improve the safety, appearance or cleanliness of neighborhoods.


CITY OF ROSES ENHANCEMENT PROGRAM



Columbia Slough Watershed Council hosted 14 naturalist events, including seven trash cleanups and six birding events at sites along the slough. Seven events were community-specific events for Black, Indigenous, and People of Color, and one event for LGBTQIA2S+ folks. Five cleanup events were open to the entire public.

FOREST GROVE ENHANCEMENT PROGRAM



Foodways by Nana Cardoon provides specialty programs to youth, seniors, low-income individuals and the houseless community, with a focus on sustainable foodways and environmental preservation. This grant was utilized to create a year-round outdoor shelter for a classroom and kitchen and develop a curriculum to teach outdoor cooking skills to the houseless community. This engaging and informational curriculum will empower individuals with skills to prepare meals in an outdoor setting.

GRESHAM ENHANCEMENT PROGRAM



The Portland Columbia Symphony Orchestra provided 162 free tickets to community members who may not have access to experiences like the orchestra. They connected with new partners in the Gresham community to build a broader audience. Audience feedback indicates they are meeting their goals to be welcoming, accessible and friendly: "Reasonable ticket cost makes great music accessible to ALL!" and "The willingness of the orchestra to engage with the audience is one of the reasons why I love PCSO."


METRO CENTRAL ENHANCEMENT PROGRAM



Trailkeepers of Oregon hosted 32 trail stewardship events with 225 volunteers and a combined 1,136 hours of volunteer service in the Bird Alliance of Oregon wild sanctuary to realign trails and improve hiker accessibility. Trailkeepers built 34 stairs, constructed 75 feet of rock wall, developed 500 feet of new trail, and decommissioned 200 feet of old trail, while revegetating the affected area with native plants. Trail parties included three women's events and two LGBTQ+ events.

Participants who receive this service describe the life-changing benefits of criminal record expungement. The program increases access to justice, education, and career training services, and addresses the lasting impacts of incarceration and experiences with the legal system.

RISE UP ENHANCEMENT PROGRAM



Corbett Fire District purchased 600 life jackets and created two new life jacket stands at Dabney and Lewis and Clark swimming areas on the Sandy River for a total of five life jacket stands. Life jacket stands are continuously restocked, serviced and cleaned and there were no recorded drownings on the Sandy River in summer 2024. The Sandy River Life Jacket Program also provides water safety education in English, Spanish and Russian at popular recreation sites along the river.
